For our Sestercentennial, our town's celebration committee is once again planning a Grand Parade. The date has been set for May 17. There will also be a three-day celebration on the weekend of August 22-24 when we will recognize our actual Incorporation Day with many fun-filled family activities.

Thanks to the generosity of four significant donors and several others, the 250th Anniversary Celebration Committee has begun planning this series of unforgettable events. These donations were crucial to laying the foundation for what promises to be a spectacular celebration. The funds will support the logistics of a parade, and the recognition of our town's Incorporation Day which will be a central highlight of the year-long celebration. Additionally, there are plans for some cultural activities which will give our townspeople an opportunity to learn about their own personal ancestry.

If additional funds are raised, the planning committee hopes to conclude the year of celebration with an unforgettable bonfire and fireworks display in the Fall.

It is the hope of the planning committee that other local civic organizations will join in the festivities by hosting their own 250th related activities and events. Through these partnering events, we will create a year-long celebration that will be remembered in the hearts and minds of our community for years to come.

The Joy House

In March 1915, Alice Joy purchased my house, a "bungalow on Church St" from William C. Winter and his son, William L. who were developing the land that had previously housed their greenhouses. Alice's husband, Daniel, was considered an expert in the milling industry and had just moved from Winthrop (MA) to become the new General Manager of the Mansfield Grain Mill. The Joys continued to live in the house and were involved in town until their deaths; Daniel in 1935 and Alice in 1938. Both are buried at Spring Brook Cemetery. The house stayed in their family, owned by their son, Donald, until after his death in 1963 when it was sold by his widow, Evelyn Shepard Joy.



Three years ago, after living in this house for 37 years, I finally learned about the Joy Family and their involvement and contributions to life in Mansfield. My

visits to the Mansfield Public Library and the Copeland House, taught me about the resources available to do the research and answer my questions. Many of these resources are now available online so you can research from your home computer or a computer at the library. You can retrace the deeds of your house on the Bristol County Registry of Deeds website. You can look at

old maps of Mansfield on the Library of Congress website. You can check the Mansfield News to see who these early residents were and how they lived. These are just some ways of recreating the past history of your home and



The Harry B. Chase Collection

The Mansfield History Center is honored to have received an extensive collection of personal papers and collections belonging to the late Harry B. Chase, a local historian and naturalist.

Born in Mansfield on September 27, 1921, Harry was a man of immense and varied talents. He had an abiding interest in the history of Mansfield. Few could rival his local knowledge. His recollections of old time Mansfield were captured in

his newspaper column "This Old Town". The column was greatly beloved by his readers. The articles were compiled into a two-volume series of books and are available for purchase at the Copeland House.

He worked throughout his life to conserve the town's natural beauty. He loved the outdoors and spent many days exploring the woods of Mansfield, which were far more expansive in his youth. He was a charter member and founder of the Natural Resources Trust of Mansfield. Harry served as clerk on Mansfield's first Conservation Commission. He greatly enjoyed working with the Boy Scouts and sharing his knowledge of nature with younger generations.

As the son of a "railroad man", Harry's knowledge of New England railroading was immense and he authored books and articles on the subject, as well as several articles on coal mining.

Harry Chase passed away in 2016 at the age of 95; then last April his wife, O. Joyce Mitchell Chase, passed away. While clearing out her house on South Main Street, Joyce's son, John Mitchell recognized the value of these notebooks and collections and contacted the historical society. The donation illustrates the diverse interests of Mr. Chase, and includes photo albums, newspaper articles, personal journals and information gathered from his research.

As with all donations, this Harry Chase Collection will be added to the resources at the Copeland House and used for research and future displays.
